OPENING HYMN "On Pentecost They Gathered" GtG 289

SCRIPTURE READINGS Acts 2 (selected verses)

ACTS 2 (selected verses) (Common English Bible+)

¹ When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. ² Suddenly a sound from heaven like the howling of a fierce wind filled the entire house where they were sitting. ³ Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. ⁴ They were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages as the Spirit enabled them to speak.

⁵ Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. ⁶ When they heard this sound, a crowd gathered. They were mystified because everyone heard them speaking in their native languages. ⁷ Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? ⁸ How then can each of us hear them speaking in our native language? ... We hear them declaring the mighty works of God in our own languages!" ¹² They were all surprised and bewildered. Some asked each other, "What does this mean?" ¹³ Others jeered at them, saying, "They are full of new wine!"

Peter stood with the other eleven apostles. He raised his voice and declared,
 "Judeans and everyone living in Jerusalem! Know this! Listen carefully to my words!
 These people are not drunk, as you suspect; after all, it is only nine o'clock in the morning!
 Rather, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

In the last days, God says,

I will pour out my Spirit on all people.

Your sons and daughters will prophesy.

Your young will see visions.

Your elders will dream dreams.

Even upon my servants, men and women,

I will pour out my Spirit in those days,

and they will prophesy.

I will cause wonders to occur in the heavens above

and signs on the earth below, ...

... before the great and spectacular day of the Lord comes.

And everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.

²² "Fellow Israelites, listen to these words! Jesus the Nazarene was a man whose credentials God proved to you through miracles, wonders, and signs, which God performed through him among you. You yourselves know this. ²³ In accordance with God's established plan and foreknowledge, he was betrayed. You, with the help of wicked men, had Jesus killed by nailing him to a cross. ²⁴ God raised him up! God freed him from death's dreadful grip, since it was impossible for death to hang on to him. ... ³² This Jesus God raised up, and of that all of us are witnesses. ³³ He was exalted to God's right side and received from the Father the promised Holy Spirit. He poured out this Spirit, and you are seeing and hearing the results of his having done so. ...

³⁶ "Therefore, let all Israel know with certainty that God has made this Jesus, whom you crucified, both Lord and Christ."

³⁷ When the crowd heard this, they were cut to the heart. They said to Peter and the other apostles, "Brothers, what should we do?"

³⁸ Peter replied, "Change your hearts and lives. Each of you must be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of your sins. Then you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit. ³⁹ This promise is for you, your children, and for all who are far away—as many as the Lord our God invites." ⁴⁰ With many other words he testified to them and encouraged them, saying, "Be saved from this perverse generation." ⁴¹ So those who welcomed his message were baptized, and that day about three thousand people were added.

⁴² They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers. ⁴³ Awe came upon everyone, and many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. ⁴⁴ All who believed were together and had all things in common; ⁴⁵ they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. ⁴⁶ Daily, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread from house to house and they shared food with gladness and simplicity of heart, ⁴⁷ praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And daily the Lord added to their number those who were being saved.

SERMON "Got It?" by Pastor Bill Vincent

Last Sunday night, we had a nice rain at our house. I stood at the open door and just listened to it falling, hitting the grass on the ground, the surface of the lake, the leaves on the trees. What a beautiful sound! The whole experience was nourishing for me. Sustaining. Reviving. It satisfied my soul. It was life-giving.

We read this story of Pentecost: the description of the wind blowing and the tongues of fire resting on the people.

And it's almost as if the Spirit -- the presence of God -- was raining down on the disciples, nourishing them. Sustaining. Reviving. Life-giving.

Love was raining down on the disciples. And they were excited and energized.

"What does this mean?" others asked.

Yes, I know, Jesus told them to stay in Jerusalem until they received this gift. Yes, I know, the Holy Spirit represents (at least as Luke tells the story) the empowerment of the disciples for the mission set before them.

But I'm wondering if there also isn't a sense in which this whole story of Pentecost represents that moment when the disciples really, truly 'got it'.

When the full import of the teaching of Christ and his very coming, his ministry and healing, his death and his resurrection and his appearances among them -- when all its truth and significance finally sunk in far enough and deep enough and broad enough to surround their hearts and open their minds and infuse their lives so that now they really 'knew', now they truly saw, now they finally 'got it'.

And the light went on, and it all came together: "Ah, this is what was happening, this is what is going on, this is what we are called to do, this is what God is about, this is what our focus in life is. This is it. Now I get it."

Love. Real love. God cares for us, always, in spite of the terrible stuff we've done, and still do.

God is not going to give up on us.

God is willing to go to hell and back for us, to get us back, to win us back, to restore us to relationship with God.

Look to the cross and see it. Peer into the empty tomb and catch a glimpse of it. Feel the Spirit blow and believe it. Embrace it and incorporate it into your life.

Love. Real love. Raining down on the people.

Now I get it!

But not everyone does. Not by a long shot.

And we don't always either, certainly not all the time.

When life is cheap -- especially someone else's life -- and we turn a blind eye to the oppression and dehumanizing of another child of God that takes place right before our eyes; then we don't get it.

When a whole class of people can be dismissed as discardable for the sake of another's comfort and convenience; then we don't get it.

When hope is scarce and our days are meaningless and life is nothing more than the next high (whether drug-induced or otherwise); then we don't get it.

And to be quite honest, I'm not sure I know how to help another person 'get it'.

When the human heart is so turned in upon itself that it cannot see the pain it inflicts upon another, and does not care; I don't know how to help that someone 'get it'.

When 'I am right and you are wrong!', in spite of all the evidence to the contrary; I don't know how to help that other 'get it'.

But I look at this burgeoning community of people that we read about in Acts 2 (the Pentecost story) -- a community on fire, with purpose, with life -- and I believe we might glean some hints of what it means to 'get it' and how -- maybe -- to share 'the getting'.

For this life is demonstrated and experienced in particular ways.

Which means it is not experienced in isolation: it is experienced in community, together with others.

Now, already I can hear some people saying, "That's fine, as long as it doesn't include such-n-such or you-know-who or watchamajigger."

Sorry, that's not the plan.

Yes, I know some such-n-such-es and some you-know-who-s and some watchamajiggers that I'd just as soon were not part of the deal, let alone part of the community.

But, that's not how it goes with this life, this calling, this invitation, this love.

It's not pick and choose, where you and I get to pick and choose.

It's pick...all...for it's God who is picking and calling and inviting.

Because I need you and you need me, and we need to embrace this life together.

And we can do that when we realize that the defining force in this life is not you and me but the God who created us in the divine image and calls us together for God's defined purpose and God's intended life.

And so this life is lived in a particular direction.

Which is the whole issue of repentance. "Change your hearts and lives" our passage translated. That's repentance: a change in direction.

Which strongly suggests that AT LEAST SOME of US SOME of the TIME have been (or are) heading in the wrong direction. Many people would say all of us most of the time are heading in the wrong direction.

This also suggests that not just any ole living will do. Remember?: life in a particular direction.

"Well, it's my life and I can do with it what I want."

I'm sorry, that's not life. Certainly not the life God calls us to.

For the direction of this life is not determined or defined by you and me, but by God: the one who gives us the breath of life, the one who knows us better than we know ourselves, the one who knows what kind of life we were created and meant and intended for.

So (once again) God gets to define and determine the shape and direction of life, especially full, abundant, eternal life.

And if our living is not towards God and in God and for others, then it's not true life. Because that's the life -- toward God, in God, for others -- that God created us for and intended for us.

And so this life will take energy and effort.

Energy, for the most part, provided by God with the gift of the Spirit.

But effort that we need to put in ourselves.

For this life is not simply a matter of being plunked down on some idyllic beach and doing nothing, or doing only what I want.

This life takes effort, it takes work, it takes time, it takes giving...of myself. I have to put myself into it to get anything, significant, out of it.

And when I do put myself into it -- when we put ourselves into it -- we see it, and we get it.

And perhaps we may even "see visions and dream dreams" out of a sense of this life's purpose and meaning.

But the dreams will not be automatic.

And the visions will not come easily.

For there is plenty of push back to this life and love that we embrace and that embraces us and yearns to embrace the world.

But we keep going -- we *can* keep going -- and keep embracing, and keep reaching out, and keep pleading for mercy, and keep calling for justice, and keep working with compassion, because this is a life empowered by love, guided by love, infused with love; so that

...every act, word, thought be love. ("Jesus, Thy Boundless Love to Me") And if we didn't get it before, maybe now we will.

That moment of realization and insight into the depths and breadth (and yes, mystery) of love.

God's love for us always.

And quite honestly, the only way I know truly to reach another's heart and show them this life and this love, is to live it.

Which is not a surefire bet that they'll get it.

Remember the cross?

But is a surefire way to proclaim that I do.

In words of compassion we share,

in deeds of mercy we offer,

in lives of care we embody with the choices we make and the actions we take,

in deeds of justice we do,

in lives of community we undertake,

in our presence of goodness and integrity,

in the truthfulness and love that we are (live) --

in this way we can proclaim to the world,

"Yeah, I get it!"

And why would we be motivated to demonstrate this life in a particular way? (in community)

Why would we be motivated to walk this life in a particular direction?

Why would we ever choose to put our energy and effort into this life?

Precisely because of this love that we now 'get'.

This love of Jesus Christ, his giving of self: the depth and length and height and breadth of his love seen in his crucifixion, and his life and love given for us.

Love so amazing, [Isaac Watts writes] so divine

demands my soul, my life, my all.

("When I Survey the Wondrous Cross")

Yes, this love demands, but this love most especially invites: that inner compulsion that wraps us in its warm embrace, to which we cannot help but respond and say 'Thank you' with every fiber of our being.

Do you get it?

AFFIRMATION OF FAITH

In life and in death we belong to God.

claims us in the waters of baptism,

feeds us with the bread of life and the cup of salvation,

and calls women and men to all ministries of the Church.

In a broken and fearful world

the Spirit gives us courage

to pray without ceasing,

to witness among all peoples to Christ as Lord and Savior,

to unmask idolatries in Church and culture,

to hear the voices of peoples long silenced,

and to work with others for justice, freedom, and peace.

In gratitude to God, empowered by the Spirit,

we strive to serve Christ in our daily tasks

and to live holy and joyful lives,

even as we watch for God's new heaven and new earth,

praying, "Come, Lord Jesus!"

With believers in every time and place,

we rejoice that nothing in life or in death

can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.
