## SCRIPTURE READING Isaiah 40:12-31

It is the time of exile.

The people have been uprooted from their homeland, torn from the only home they have ever known.

The sentiment is echoed in one of their psalms:

How could we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land? (Psalm 137:4 NRSV) "The Lord will not hear, we have been taken too far away. Surely we are forsaken. The circumstances of my life are hidden from God and erased from God's sight. And God does not care for me, or cannot."

Like the question raised in another of their psalms:

*My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?* (Psalm 22:1 NRSV)

And into these dark circumstances, in response to this despairing question, the prophet offers this response:

**ISAIAH** 40:12-31 (New Revised Standard Version) <sup>12</sup> Who has measured the waters in the hollow of the hand and marked off the heavens with a span, enclosed the dust of the earth in a measure, and weighed the mountains in scales and the hills in a balance? <sup>13</sup> Who has directed the spirit of the Lord, or as ... counselor has instructed the Lord? <sup>14</sup> Whom did God consult for ... enlightenment, and who taught God the path of the right? Who taught God knowledge, and showed God the way of understanding? <sup>15</sup> Even the nations are like a drop from a bucket, and are accounted as dust on the scales: see, the Lord takes up the isles like fine dust. <sup>16</sup> Lebanon would not provide fuel enough, nor are its animals enough for a burnt offering. <sup>17</sup> All the nations are as nothing before the Lord; they are accounted by God as less than nothing and emptiness. <sup>18</sup> To whom then will you liken God, or what likeness compare with God? <sup>19</sup> An idol? -- A worker casts it,

and a goldsmith overlays it with gold, and casts for it silver chains.

<sup>20</sup> As a gift one chooses mulberry wood -- wood that will not rot --

then seeks out a skilled artisan to set up an image that will not topple.

<sup>21</sup> Have you not known? Have you not heard? Has it not been told you from the beginning? Have you not understood from the foundations of the earth?
<sup>22</sup> This is the one who sits above the circle of the earth, and its inhabitants are like grasshoppers; who stretches out the heavens like a curtain, and spreads them like a tent to live in;
<sup>23</sup> who brings princes to naught, and makes the rulers of the earth as nothing.

<sup>24</sup> Scarcely are they planted, scarcely sown, scarcely has their stem taken root in the earth, when God blows upon them, and they wither, and the tempest carries them off like stubble.

<sup>25</sup> To whom then will you compare me, or who is my equal? says the Holy One.
<sup>26</sup> Lift up your eyes on high and see: Who created these?
The one who brings out their host and numbers them, calling them all by name;
because God is great in strength, mighty in power, not one is missing.

<sup>27</sup> Why do you say, O Jacob, and speak, O Israel, "My way is hidden from the Lord, and my right is disregarded by my God"? <sup>28</sup> Have you not known? Have you not heard? The Lord is the everlasting God the Creator of the ends of the earth. The Lord does not faint or grow weary; God's understanding is unsearchable. <sup>29</sup> God gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless. <sup>30</sup> Even youths will faint and be weary, and the young will fall exhausted; <sup>31</sup> but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint.

### **PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION**

### SERMON "Have WE?" by Pastor Bill Vincent

The people are despondent and despairing; without hope, believing they have been abandoned by their God: "Surely we have been wrenched from the grasp of our God!"

And the prophet asks: *"Have you not known? Have you not heard?"* Yes, they had.

Only they lived as if they had not.

Have we not known? Have we not heard?

In fact, we have heard, we have known.

Only we live as if we had not heard, as if we did not know.

We cower before threats to life and limb, as if we were but helpless babes in arms and knew not the Almighty God, Lord of heaven and earth.

We stumble blindly down the pathways of life as if we heard not the voice of our Master, and the divine call to mercy and forgiveness, justice and compassion.

We fumble in our mind's eye for some truth upon which to lay hold, as if we had not been told from the beginning of the one who is the way and the truth and the life.

We walk with our knees shaking and our lives quaking, as if we did not understand that the foundations of the earth itself rest upon the rock that is our Lord and our God, our refuge and our strength.

At a pastor's retreat, we talked about the changes we were all experiencing: changes in the world and culture, in our community and our lives.

And the leader sought to remind us each time that we always have access to the power of the living God.

Some change may be good, some change may be not-so-good. And often we do not know the difference.

Yet even in the midst of changing times and times that change,

... we will not fear, though the earth should change,

though the mountains shake in the heart of the sea;

though its waters roar and foam,

though the mountains tremble with its tumult.

# (Psalm 46:2-3 NRSV)

The foundation of our assumptions and presumptions about life quakes beneath us. Mountains of responsibility tremble.

Mountains of expectations shake.

The sea of life roars and foams, tossing us this way and that.

And we are terrified.

And we despair.

Yet in the midst of forces that seem to unmake us, God is our refuge and strength a very present – an ever-present – help in times of trouble.

The one who holds in the divine hands the fiery stars and the deathly cold of space, holds us in those same hands.

The God who guides each fragile monarch butterfly on its 2,000-mile migration guides us from womb to tomb...and beyond.

The one who weeps for each sparrow who falls by the way weeps each time we fall by the wayside.

The God who cares enough to bring the sun up every morning, cares as well for us.

The one who searches out the heavens and knows every star by name, searches out the human heart and knows our deepest pain.

The God who crafts the delicate hoarfrost and forms each crystalline snowflake, seeks to craft and form us as well.

The power and majesty and might of the Creator God are available to us for the living of our days, for walking in God's ways.

With an important clarifier.

Children's song:

### My God is so big, so strong and so mighty, there's nothing my God cannot do...for you!

True.

However, just because there's nothing God cannot do does not mean God will do just anything for me.

All things may be possible. But, as Walter Brueggemann once noted,

not all things are promised. (Genesis, Interpretation series)

God did not promise a rose garden, but God did promise help and strength. God did not promise freedom from suffering, but did promise perseverance and peace, even in suffering.

God's power and majesty and might are available to us, but not for our personal will and whim, or to condone our own twisted version of life.

For God will be true to Godself. So God will be true to us with a truth beyond the truest true, a truth with which we, unfortunately, are all too *un*familiar.

Which may be why the way in which God leads and the way in which God helps may not always be to our liking.

For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord. (Isaiah 55:8 NRSV)

The way to life may be through death on a cross. The way to joy may be through the sorrow of loss. The way to strength may be through embracing our weakness. The way to wisdom may be through the foolishness of the gospel. The way to peace may be through the turmoil of confrontation.

For it is God's way and God's life, God's peace and God's justice that God seeks to establish in our lives.

All of which is God being true to God, and we can ask for nothing better – or truer – in life than that.

And so I wonder...

When we hear of wars and rumors of wars, conflict and confrontation, do we respond out of fear and despair? or out of faith and determination?

Not to suggest I know the answer to the world's problems or governmental policy questions.

But I am suggesting that responding out of faith will bring us far closer to God's purposes and way for us than responding out of fear.

"I can do all things through the one who strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13 NRSV), the Apostle Paul wrote.

He knew whereof he spoke.

He described his life: flogged, whipped, beaten, stoned, ship-wrecked, imprisoned (see II Corinthians 11:23-27). All along he sought to be faithful to the one he followed.

The one he followed, who even in the most despairing time of *his* life – hanging from a cross – prayed to God, *"Into your hands I commit my spirit"* (Luke 23:46).

Into the hands of the one who...

takes up the isles like fine dust ... and weigh[s] the mountains in scales and the hills in a balance? Into these hands we commit our lives.

So, even in pandemic and pandemonium, through political upheaval and economic chaos, we can run with perseverance the race set before us and not be weary, if we would but wait at the feet of the Lord of heaven and earth

who has measured the waters in the hollow of the hand and marked off the heavens with a span.

We can walk even in the way of sorrows – to our own cross – and not faint, if we would but wait upon the one who waits upon us in Jesus Christ, and offers us life beyond our imagining.

Surely the one who lifts up the Rockies from their base and carves the Mississippi's run to the sea, knows something of this life we live.

Surely the one who clothes the lilies of the field and feeds the birds of the air, can be trusted for this life we live.

Yes, all too often the experience of the exiles echoes our own experience. And there are those times when we ask the questions of our exile from faith, from hope:

-Has God forsaken us?

-Has God forgotten us?

-Have the circumstances of life hidden us from the grace-filled gaze of God?

-Has the situation of life snatched us from the guiding grasp of God?

To which Paul answers a resounding 'No!'

Not life or death, nothing that happens today or may happen tomorrow, no power from on high nor power from below – absolutely nothing has any power to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. (Romans 8:38-39)
The prophet could not agree more.
Have you not known? Have you not heard?
The Lord is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth.
Have we not known? Have we not heard?
Indeed, we have.
So let us live by that hearing.
Let us live in that knowledge.
And let us walk and work and worship with confidence, trusting in the God who made us

with the divine hands, and holds us in those hands even now.

And let the gathered people of God breathe a sigh of relief, and let them say, 'Amen'.
