One: Then take the towel, and break the bread,

and humble us, and call us friends.

All: Suffer and serve till all are fed and show how grandly love intends to work till all creation sings, to fill all worlds, to crown all things.

One: Great God, in Christ you set us free All: your life to live, your joy to share.

One: Give us your Spirit's liberty

to turn from guilt and dull despair

All: and offer all that faith can do

while love is making all things new.

SCRIPTURE READING I John 3:1-2,11,16-24

I JOHN 3:1-2,16-24 (various)

¹ See what kind of love the Father has given to us in that we should be called God's children, and that is what we are! The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know God. ² Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when Christ is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is.

11 This is the message you heard from the beginning: We should love one another.

¹⁶ This is how we know love: Christ laid down his life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters. ¹⁷ Whoever has the goods of the world and sees a brother or sister who has need, yet closes their heart against them...how does the love of God abide in that person? ¹⁸ Little children, let us not love in word or speech, but in truth and deed. ¹⁹ This is how we will know that we belong to the truth and reassure our hearts in God's presence. ²⁰ Even if our hearts condemn us, God is greater than our hearts and knows all things. ²¹ Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have confidence before God; ²² and we receive from God whatever we ask, because we keep God's commandments and do what pleases God. ²³ This is God's commandment, that we believe in the name of God's Son, Jesus Christ, and love one another as commanded. ²⁴ All who keep God's commandments abide in God, and God abides in them. And by this we know that God abides in us, by the Spirit that God has given us.

PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

SERMON "'Don't Talk of Love..." by Pastor Bill Vincent

Eliza Doolittle is irritated. In the musical "My Fair Lady," Eliza has been taught to speak "proper like" in order to pass in high society. She has a young suitor – or would-be suitor – who can do the same; but it seems that's all he can do: talk. In her irritation, Eliza challenges him:

"Don't talk of love...

Show me!"

("Show Me" by Alan Jay Lerner and Frederick Loewe)

Seems appropriate to mention this, seeing as it is we live in the "Show Me" state.

But for our purposes, I want us to think of "show me" not as in the entrenched skeptic with arms crossed, saying, "Just try to convince me I'm wrong; I dare you."

But "show me" as in demonstrate the reality of what is said: that something is really real (like we mentioned last week).

Like a tulip. You know, the beautiful flowers we have seen much of recently, in our yards, in the yards of neighbors, as we drive down the street.

You don't have to tell me there's a bulb in the ground beneath the surface. The existence of the flower demonstrates quite conclusively that there's a bulb there.

So, don't tell me there's a bulb of love in the ground – or your heart – show me.

Because sometimes the bulb's a dud.

Are we?

But I get ahead of myself.

Actually, we need to take a step (or two) back before we proceed.

For the starting point for my being able to demonstrate love is my knowing I am loved. Which is precisely where John starts.

See what kind of love the Father has given to us in that we should be called God's children, and that is what we are! (v.1)

Of course, we could respond, "That's nothing but 'words, words, words'."

Except that God "shows us."

The Apostle Paul says,

God proves God's love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us. (Romans 5:8 NRSV)

John says simply,

This is how we know love: Christ laid down his life for us. (v.16)

Christ's giving of his life, Christ's giving up his life, demonstrates quite conclusively his love for us, God's love for us.

From that foundation – a foundation we must never forget, a foundation we must always hold before us, a foundation that is our assurance and confidence – from that foundation – and from that example – we are empowered to love...and not be a dud bulb.

We can live into that love, embrace that love, show that love by loving one another.

This is how we know love: Christ laid down his life for us, and we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters. Whoever has the goods of the world and sees a brother or sister who has need, yet closes their heart against them...how does the love of God abide in that person? (v.16-17)

John gets right to the point: simple, practical.

And we could spend all day working out the implications and describing what this looks like.

But instead, this morning, let me simply offer a couple of insights.

Lindsey Jodrey (of Princeton Theological Seminary) reminds us of another story about Jesus: he has gathered with his disciples the night before he is betrayed, and washes his disciples' feet...right before he gives them a 'new commandment': to love one another.

Jodrey writes,

In a desert climate where most travel was on foot, washing someone's feet was no small task. In fact, this task was saved for servants and slaves of the lowest ranks. It was a humble job, but it was also essential. ... To wash someone's feet was to recognize the need of another and to use one's own effort and resources to meet that need. (Connections, 242-243)

Did you hear it?

- -needs
- -resources
- -effort...or action

We're not called to meet all the needs of the world, but the needs we see. So we have to look.

We're not expected to offer resources that we do not have, but the resources we do have. Which means we have to be honest about the resources that are available to us.

And not in words only, but we must act: we must do something.

For if I see a need and do not act, I do not love.

If I deny the resources available to me to offer to meet that need, I do not love.

I mentioned last week that today is Blue Sunday: A Day of Prayer for Abused Children and Those Who Rescue Them. Do we see the need? What resources are available to us? And will we act?

This past Thursday was Earth Day, this month of April Earth Month.

Surely we see the need.

What resources will we bring to bear to demonstrate Christ's "lay down one's life" love for the world? for the creation? for all God's creatures? We may not have the resources to address everything needed, but what resources do we have?

And will we put aside our convenience in order to do the right thing for the planet?

We heard the verdict this week in the trial of Derek Chauvin for the murder of George Floyd. Just this week there were other instances of shootings and death and the cry of injustice.

Will we acknowledge the need to stand up for the dignity of every human life? Will we claim the resources of time and voice and connections? And will we act?

For to say it and not do it is not to mean it at all.

And so Jesus said,

"What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' He answered, 'I will not'; but later he changed his mind and went. The father went to the second and said the same; and he answered, 'I go, sir'; but he did not go. Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." (Matthew 21:28-31 NRSV)

Claudia Highbaugh (Dean of Religious and Spiritual Life, Connecticut College, New London, CT) shares this:

Love in deed...is the active and willing response to meet the needs at hand with the goods at hand. (Feasting: Pastoral Perspective)

And don't ever doubt that you have 'goods at hand'.

There was a contest to find the most caring child.

The winner was a four year old child whose next door neighbor was an elderly gentleman who had recently lost his wife. Upon seeing the man cry, the little boy went into the old gentleman's yard, climbed onto his lap, and just sat there. When his Mother asked what he had said to the neighbor, the little boy said, "Nothing, I just helped him cry." (story attributed to author and lecturer Leo Buscaglia)

He saw the need, knew he had something to offer, and did it.

Little children, let us not love in word or speech, but in truth and deed. (v.18)

"Don't talk of love...

Show me!"

Just as God showed us.
