MARK 12:38-44 (Common English Bible+)

³⁸ As he was teaching, he said, "Watch out for the scribes. They like to walk around in long robes. They want to be greeted with honor in the markets. ³⁹ They long for places of honor in the synagogues and at banquets. 40 They are the ones who cheat

widows out of their homes, and to show off they say long prayers. They will be judged most harshly."

⁴¹ Jesus sat across from the collection box for the temple treasury and observed how the crowd gave their money. Many rich people put in large sums. ⁴² One poor widow came forward and put in two small copper coins worth a penny. ⁴³ Jesus called his disciples to him and said, "I assure you that this poor widow has put in more than everyone who's been putting money in the treasury. ⁴⁴ For all of them have contributed out of their abundance; but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on."

PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

SERMON "All In" by Pastor Bill Vincent

We picture her: bent over, weighed down by life; perhaps ragged, old(?); certainly she is shy, trying to blend in with the crowd, furtive almost; maybe even ashamed of what she has to drop into the treasury receptacle.

She doesn't give much – she doesn't have much to give. But she gives it. She gives it willingly. She gives it determinedly. She gives it even joyfully.

And in that giving, we admire her; we are inspired by her.

Except when we're not.

I wonder: are there times when we don't admire her, when we are not inspired by her, because...well, we're angry with her, even resentful, because she does what we can't – or won't.

Jesus is in Jerusalem. He is teaching the people and debating with the religious authorities.

He has told them to "render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's" (Mark 12:17 RSV) – which is everything.

He has affirmed the greatest commandment of all in "loving the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength"; with the second being to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:30&31 NRSV).

It is the final week of his ministry.

Indeed, this story is the final public act of his ministry, with a slap at the religious authorities...or at least the scribes...or at least some scribes.

"Give it to 'em, Jesus!" those smug, self-righteous religious types throwing around their weight, or their money.

Let's admit: We like it when Jesus takes a jab at the scribes, and others.

Until we walk by the mirror of life and catch a glimpse of ourselves in it.

And come to realize we are more like the scribes, and 'those rich folk', than we find it comfortable to admit.

We actually have so much to give.

But we don't.

We drop in our money, and feel good about ourselves, and think we've done our bit. We take an hour for worship on a couple of Sundays, and think we've done our share. Now we can get on with life, our life. We've paid our dues – paid God our dues; or paid God God's due – and we're good for a week or so...until the next time.

And then there comes this widow: this woman who doesn't give much because she doesn't have much to give.

But she gives her all: "everything she had, all she had to live on."

And that's what Jesus highlights; that's what he lifts up and celebrates; that's what Jesus holds up as an example.

It is a glance back at the scribes and 'those who are rich'.

But it is also a glance forward, a model for what is to come: of someone else who gives *his* all, and demonstrates that conclusively hanging from a cross.

[--communion table--] "This is my body...this is my blood...for you."

All in.

That's what she is. That's what she does.

All in.

That's what he is. That's what he does.

All in.

Not partially. Not hanging back, tossing in a little bit here, doing a little bit there; keeping God at arm's length by "giving out of their spare change," as one translation says it.

But every aspect of my life dedicated, offered, devoted to serving God.

No matter that it doesn't seem to be a lot, at least from our perspective.

It's a lot of what matters. It's all of what matters. It's the heart. Giving from the heart. Giving the heart. Giving the self, myself – all of the self, all of me.

Not simply an outward show of giving, of dedication. Not an easy ostentation without proper motivation.

But all in.

In love with God.

Loving God with ALL my heart and ALL my soul and ALL my strength and ALL my mind.

And in that all-inclusive love for God, loving my neighbor with all my heart, and loving all my neighbors with all my heart.

Not where some things are out of bounds for God, or for others.

Not where some things are off limits to God, and others.

But all in...cluded.

As the sign says in front of the church:

#LOVE THY NEIGHBOR

And right below that in parentheses, in letters just as big,

(NO EXCEPTIONS)

(First Friends Meeting-A Quaker Church, Greensboro, NC)

All in. For all are in-cluded.

Like some of those 'saints' we remember who point us in that direction by their example and their choices and their life; who gave so much of their life that their life touched and changed our life.

All in.

Like some of those veterans we will remember this coming Thursday (Veterans Day): those who "gave the last full measure of devotion" as Abraham Lincoln put it (Gettysburg Address).

We may not always be asked to give the "*last* full measure of devotion," but we are asked to give our "*full* measure of devotion," up to and even including our *last*.

As Jesus said,

No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. (John 15:13 NRSV)

This is no complex formula or tricky equation: 'if I give this and do this and then do that, I'm good'.

It's much simpler than that...and far more profound:

that all that we do, that all that we say, that all that we are reflects the love of God and embodies our love for God and God's love for all.

All in.

Remember last Sunday's story of Ruth: sticking with Naomi, by her side; life connected to life.

At yesterday's Presbytery meeting, we heard from a mission co-worker for the PCUSA in Central America. She spoke of our work and mission as a partnership with people.

A partnership takes time, an investment of self. It is not a quick fix or easy solution to life's problems; but a sharing of life, walking through life together.

And I am all in with you.

And you are all in with me.

And together we can make a difference in the world and people's lives.

Because we are 'all in' in this community which is the body of Christ in the world and for the world.

And all it takes is two copper coins...and all that you have to live on.
All it takes is a willingness to risk...and all the days of your life.
All it takes is a smile, a hand, a heart...and all that you are
for all that He offers
for all that He will do in you.

All in. Are we?
