II SAMUEL 23:1-7 (New Revised Standard Version)

¹ Now these are the last words of David:

The oracle of David, son of Jesse, the oracle of the man whom God exalted, the anointed of the God of Jacob, the favorite of the Strong One of Israel:

The spirit of the Lord speaks through me, God's word is upon my tongue.

- The God of Israel has spoken, the Rock of Israel has said to me:
 - One who rules over people justly, ruling in the fear of God,
- is like the light of morning,

like the sun rising on a cloudless morning, gleaming from the rain on the grassy land.

Is not my house like this with God?

For God has made with me an everlasting covenant, ordered in all things and secure.

Will God not cause to prosper all my help and my desire?

⁶ But the godless are all like thorns that are thrown away;

for they cannot be picked up with the hand;

to touch them one uses an iron bar or the shaft of a spear.

And they are entirely consumed in fire on the spot.

³³ Then Pilate entered the headquarters again, summoned Jesus, and asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?" ³⁴ Jesus answered, "Do you ask this on your own, or did others tell you about me?" ³⁵ Pilate replied, "I am not a Jew, am I? Your own nation and the chief priests have handed you over to me. What have you done?" ³⁶ Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not from this world. If my kingdom were from this world, my followers would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jewish authorities. But as it is, my kingdom is not from here." ³⁷ Pilate asked him, "So you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. For this I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone who belongs to the truth listens to my voice."

To him who loves us and freed us from our sins by his blood, ⁶ and made us to be a kingdom, priests serving his God and Father, to him be glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen.

PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

SERMON "The Upside Down and Right Side Up King" by Pastor Bill Vincent

"Hosanna in the highest!" we hear, "Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!"

Then, "Crucify him!"

Both actually seem out of place, here on this third Sunday of November.

Reading the Gospel of John passage seems out of place.

For that matter, Jesus seemed out of place...to many people.

They may not have known what place he belonged. But they knew – if only intuitively – that he didn't fit in their place, their system, their way of doing things, their world.

And indeed, they were right.

Jesus answered, "My kingdom is not from this world."

So they crucified him, got him out of the way. And that was that. He had been judged out of place, out of order. And his death confirmed their verdict and their way.

Or so they thought.

As we read this passage from John, it appears, for all intents and purposes, that Jesus is the one that is on trial.

Actually, the reverse is closer to the truth.

It is Pilate who is on trial: Pilate and his way, Pilate and his world; Pilate and OUR world.

Think back to II Samuel 23, speaking of

One who rules over people justly,

ruling in the fear of God.

One of my first reactions: "The one who rules rightly" is...an anomaly, a rarity, like unheard of. A leader like this is seemingly non-existent. It seems most leaders are only in it for the prestige or power, to feather their own nest. As we witness the sparring that takes place in Congress, and other halls of government. They say what they need to say to get their way.

But we need not feel too good about ourselves as opposed to those corrupt politicians, or "whomever" out there.

Out of fear for the security of our own self-made world, we will gossip behind other people's backs, spread rumors and out-and-out lies, or keep conveniently silent to discredit those who disagree with us.

Instead of talking and listening in order to understand, we turn up the volume of our own rhetoric in order to drown out what others say so we don't have to listen.

Ours is a world where rhetoric is king, and power is viceroy.

And into this fray of jockeying for position and power, and fighting for turf and territory, steps this man Jesus.

"Are you the King of the Jews?"
"So you are a king?"

Pilate asks.

"Yes, in a way," Jesus says, "but not your way."

"If my kingdom were from this world, my followers would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jewish authorities."

he responds.

C.K. Barrett points out,

Kings of this world naturally fight for supremacy; that Jesus and his followers do not do so shows that his kingdom is of a different order. (The Gospel According to St. John, p.537)

Jesus may be king, yes; but of a different order, in a different manner. King of a different world, yet king of all the world.

What makes him a king is not military might nor political prowess.

What makes him a king is his testifying to the truth and embodying that truth: the truth of God's way; the truth of our intended relationship to God and each other.

What makes him a king is his willingness to give of his life and give up his life in order to do the will of his Father in heaven.

What makes him a king is his greatness, not in lording it over others, but in serving others...and calling us to do the same.

Revelation proclaims him king:

the ruler of the kings of the earth.

The resurrection proclaims him Lord.

He is Christ, the King,

who rules over people justly, ruling in the fear of God.

He is Christ, the King, who rules in truth, because he is the truth.

He is Christ, the King, who rules over all, not by grasping power, but by the power given him by God.

This is the truth we proclaim.

It is the truth we lay hold of, because it is the truth that lays hold of us.

So we proclaim that he is Lord of all of life...and that includes Pilate, and all the rest.

"But," you say, "all the evidence suggests otherwise." So, it calls for faith...with a little help.

Go back to our scripture passages.

II Samuel 23 gave a hint. And it was true.

John 18 presents a picture. And it is true.

Revelation 1 shares a vision. And there is no need for us to doubt it is true.

It takes faith. As the letter to Hebrews puts it, that

assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. (Hebrews 11:1 NRSV)

Like the assurance to those to whom Revelation was written: a people under persecution, hounded and hunted. And in the midst of their pain and suffering, trials and tribulations, they were told to remember, Jesus is Lord...already.

Twila Paris is the well-known Christian singer. With numerous awards and a wide-spread popularity for her songs, "You might think she had it all together. But when a series of personal challenges and her husband's lengthy illness made her feel hopeless, she read what the Bible says about God's faithfulness and sovereignty. Her experience inspired her to write" these words:

God has never let you down Why start to worry now? God is still the Lord of all we see And is still the loving Father Watching over you and me

..

This is no time for fear

• • •

Don't lose the vision here

...

There is one thing that has always been true It holds the world together (CHORUS:)

God is in control

We believe that God's children will not be forsaken

...

We will choose to remember and never be shaken There is no power above or beside God, we know God is in control

("God Is In Control" 1994)

That's what it means to affirm that Christ is King.

This is not intended to be some "pie in the sky" philosophy of life, somehow detached from reality.

For remember: the One who "reigns in power" is also the Crucified One, intimately acquainted with the pain and tragedy, the chaos and injustice of life.

Here is a king who wears, not a crown of gold, but a crown of thorns; who lives not detached from the pain of his people, but intimately involved in the midst of their pain.

Here is a king who does not command us to diminish ourselves and grovel at his feet, but who instead comes to us and kneels before us and washes our feet.

Here is a king who rules, not by intimidation, but by love.

And in all of this, we, as his followers, are called to do the same:

"But whoever wishes to become great among you [he says,] must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all. For the Son of Humankind came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many." (Mark 10:42-45 NRSV)

Paul paints the big picture when he writes,

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death-even death on a cross. Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. (Philippians 2:5-11 NRSV)

So,

when the world is going to hell on a sled, when the world is falling apart, when YOUR world is falling apart,

let us remember:

Jesus is Lord, Christ is King – still. And 'God IS in control'.

So Paul could affirm, in his own troubles, and in ours,

We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed; always

carrying in the body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be made visible in our bodies. (II Corinthians 4:7-11 NRSV)

...in our lives.

That's how we see Christ's Lordship among us now: in his sustaining and transforming work in our lives, in his guiding us and protecting us, providing for us and upholding us as his followers as we seek to walk in his way.

So that in our life – even if not in the world around us – it might be clear that Jesus Christ is King.
