SCRIPTURE READINGS Exodus 3:1-6

Ephesians 6:10-17

EXODUS 3:1-6 (NRSV)

¹ Moses was keeping the flock of his father-in-law Jethro, the priest of Midian; he led his flock beyond the wilderness, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. ² There the angel of the Lord appeared to him in a flame of fire out of a bush; he looked, and the bush was blazing, yet it was not consumed. ³ Then Moses said, "I must turn aside and look at this great sight, and see why the bush is not burned up." ⁴ When the Lord saw that he had turned aside to see, God called to him out of the bush, "Moses, Moses!" And he said, "Here I am." ⁵ Then God said, "Come no closer! Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground." ⁶ God said further, "I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob." And Moses hid his face, for he was afraid to look at God.

from EXODUS 12:1-11 (NRSV)

This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the Lord.

from MARK 6:6b-13 (NRSV)

He called the twelve and began to send them out two by two. He ordered them to take nothing for their journey except a staff; no bread, no bag, no money in their belts; but to wear sandals and not to put on two tunics. He said to them, "Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them." So they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. They cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them.

from ACTS 12:6-11 (NRSV)

Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, "Get up quickly." And the chains fell off his wrists. The angel said to him, "Fasten your belt and put on your sandals." He did so. Then he said to him, "Wrap your cloak around you and follow me." Peter went out and followed him out of the prison and into the city.

EPHESIANS 6:10-17 (NRSV)

¹⁰ Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his power. ¹¹ Put on the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil. ¹² For our struggle is not against enemies of blood and flesh, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers of this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places. ¹³ Therefore take up the whole armor of God, so that you may be able to withstand on that evil day, and having done everything, to stand firm. ¹⁴ Stand therefore, and fasten the belt of truth around your waist, and put on the breastplate of righteousness. ¹⁵ As shoes for your feet put on whatever will make you ready to proclaim the gospel of peace. ¹⁶ With all of these, take the shield of faith, with which you will be able to quench all the flaming arrows of the evil one. ¹⁷ Take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God.

PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

SERMON "Off? or On? How 'bout Both!" by Pastor Bill Vincent

I think of shoes as imminently practical.

You see, I'm not a barefoot kind of guy. I need my shoes to protect my feet from the pain of sharp objects or stubbing my toes. I need my shoes to offer support in my walking and to keep my feet warm and dry.

Shoes are very practical.

And forgettable. I tend to put them on and forget about them. I mean, (without looking!) who here remembers exactly what the shoes they are wearing look like? how many eyelets? how many seams? the color of the thread? And does it really matter that much?

Forgettable. Right?

Except when they're not doing their job. And there's a crack in the sole and your feet get wet walking through a puddle. Or a pebble finds its way in, and it's a painful reminder of the need for protection from such sharp, hard objects.

Shoes. Imminently practical, and forgettable. Until...well, you know.

As I reflected on shoes and pondered their role for us, especially in light of our various scripture passages, it was interesting to note that

-shoes are to be removed when we find ourselves in the presence of the divine.

-but shoes are to be put on when we discern the call and mission of the divine.

"Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you are standing is holy ground," God says to Moses.

"Take nothing for your journey except a staff...and wear sandals," Jesus instructs the disciples as he sends them out two by two to minister among the people.

"This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly," the instructions say to the Hebrews as they prepare to flee Egypt and slavery, and begin a new chapter of their journey as the people of God.

"Put on your sandals," the angel instructs Peter as they prepare to escape the prison in which Peter was confined.

"As shoes for your feet put on whatever will make you ready to proclaim the gospel of peace," Paul instructs the Ephesians in their preparation for the task and ministry and life at hand.

Shoes off in the presence of God.

Shoes on in the service of the Lord.

To take your shoes off in the presence of God is a show of respect and honor, and reverence. It is done by many even today. Muslims remove their shoes upon entering the mosque.

In some ways it recognizes something different than regular life: something special, something beyond the 'ordinary'. As shoes find themselves face down in the dirt and grime of life, to take them off is to signal a separating of ourselves (at least for the moment) from the down and dirty of life, to something holy, other, divine.

But I wonder, too, if perhaps there is also a sense in which, to take one's shoes off is to present oneself vulnerable before God.

You know, we mentioned the protection shoes provide, protecting our feet from rocks and pointy objects, from hot sand and freezing water.

But to come into the presence of God - truly to present oneself before the Almighty – is to strip away those sometimes artificial protections, and present ourselves as we are: open, honest, vulnerable. It is a recognition of our true status before God: before the divine, all-knowing One who knows us better than we know ourselves, from whom we cannot truly hide, before whom we are already laid bare, and so maybe it's time for us to acknowledge that for ourselves, and for God, and before God.

"God: this is who I am. You know it. You know me. So I take off the masks I wear before others; I lower the shield I use to protect myself from others; I take off the shoes of my scared, hidden self; and present myself before you, just as I am."

And God invites that honesty, knowing it's necessary for our own health and well-being. And God embraces us in that nakedness, that unprotected mode, that vulnerability and honesty.

And here, with our shoes off and our vulnerability on, we discover that we don't have to hide from God. God accepts us and embraces us warts and all, fears and all, uncertainties and even presumed deficiencies and all.

That's the wonder we experience in the presence of the divine...with our shoes off.

And then this same God tells us to put our shoes on.

Different shoes, mind you, than the ones we took off. Not the shoes of self-protection and even self*ish*-protection; not the shoes of self-hiding and even self-loathing.

But the shoes of preparation, the shoes of readiness.

And the shoes of willingness: willingness to hear the call and embrace the journey and follow in the path of the one who goes before us and shows us the way, the one who walks beside us and accompanies us every step of the way.

-Remember: Jesus told the disciples not to take much at all in their mission. But they did need their shoes. They needed to be prepared for the road.

For sometimes they would be welcomed. And they needed to be prepared for that. And sometimes they would be rejected. And they needed to be prepared for that.

-And the angel told Peter to put on his shoes before they up and left the prison. He needed to be ready for what was to come. He needed to be ready to step out of his confinement and step out in faith into a new day and a new journey, and even a new challenge.

-And Paul tells the Ephesians to put on the shoes of "whatever will make you ready to proclaim the gospel of peace."

What will make us ready? What do we need to be prepared?

Do we need to learn from the Word of God?

Do we need assurance and support from the community of faith?

Do we need sustenance and encouragement of the Spirit?

Yes to all of that.

And perhaps deep down, even more so, what we really need is a willing heart and an open mind and a stalwart soul.

And open eyes. Yes, (oddly enough) open eyes are also a part of the footwear of our mission and ministry. For as Paul reminds us, the opponents of our task are not always those which are most obvious; but unseen forces and intentions, subconscious desires and plans (sometimes even our own). And we must be prepared with eyes that are open to the truth and minds that are steeled to the resistance we will face.

All the while remembering who it is who has sent us on this journey, this mission: the God before whom we have laid ourselves bare; the God who knows us better than we know ourselves.

Which means that, when we hear that call to engage in that ministry that is new and different – and beyond our comfort zone – we remember it is the God who knows our gifts and abilities better than we know ourselves who has sent us down this path.

And when we're not sure we're up to it, remember it is the God who knows our strength better than we know it ourselves who has placed this task before us.

The God who knows the calling for which we were created and intended from our beginning, for our fulfillment and purpose, and the fulfillment of God's purpose.

And when we question and wonder – and we will, and we do – and even fear, our purpose and our mission, the journey in which we find ourselves; again, remember the one who sends us: it is Jesus, the Christ, "the pioneer and perfecter of our faith" (Hebrews 12:2) and of our life. The one who, as God in the flesh, is the ultimate example of "walking in someone else's shoes": you know, incarnation, in the flesh, in our flesh, in our life. So, he knows the way...and its obstacles; he is the way; and he walks this way with us.

So when we doubt that we can do this calling we discern for ourselves, when we question this ministry to which we as a congregation are called, when we wonder if we are up to it...

...know that he was been in our shoes; and he helps us put on the shoes we need for our journey and our task, for our calling and our mission; and he will walk with us down the path he has set before us.

The journey is ahead of us. Are we ready? So, let's put on our shoes...and Go!
