¹ On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the Sabbath, they were watching him closely. ...

⁷ When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. ⁸ "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host, ⁹ and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. ¹⁰ But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. ¹¹ For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

¹² He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers and sisters or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. ¹³ But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. ¹⁴ And you will be blessed because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

SERMON "Bumped from the Head Table to the Kitchen" by Pastor Bill Vincent

Jesus may not make the top ten list for Miss Manners, but he may have a point.

"Don't go up, lest you be sent down."

Good advice...to begin with.

I mean, he puts his finger on the problem. Our problem: thinking too much of ourselves, tooting our own horn. We assume, of course, that we belong at the head table, the place of honor and high esteem.

"Of course we should be chair of the committee. We're right. People listen to us. We should have top billing. We should go first. That's where we belong."

Jesus suggests instead, "Go down; then you may go up."

Sounds all right to begin with.

But then...can't you just see the wheels turning? Your wheels and mine. Doesn't Jesus know the kind of people he's dealing with?

"Ah ha! The way to the head table is to go to the lowest seat!"

Then, like a game of musical chairs, there's a mad dash for the lowest seat. Everyone rushing down with a glint in their eye, watching out of the corner of their eye; waiting for the host to invite them up so they can sit at their 'rightful place'.

Ah! The lengths to which we will go to get to the head table, the place of honor. With false modesty, which is no modesty at all.

"Me? I'm not proud. No, I won't toot my own horn. I won't tell people about all the good things I've done." All the while thinking to ourselves, "I hope they notice what good things I'm doing and how 'humble' I am."

Perhaps we'd better forget about being one of the guests, let alone sitting at the head table.

Maybe we should think of ourselves being a host instead.

Yeh, that's the ticket. That's where we belong: serving others; receiving others as host, serving them as host.

That's actually a good example, a good lead, a good precedent.

"For the Son of Humankind came not to be served but to serve...." (Mark 10:45 NRSV)

The Greek word for 'serving' actually means "serving at table." If you've ever had that experience of serving table as a waiter or waitress, you know it's grunt work, thankless, dirty. And you can't be too full of yourself here in this role.

But even here this advice can be corrupted, twisted by us. We think: "If we serve others, they'll be in our debt; then maybe we can get them to serve us in return." 'Tit for tat.' 'I'll scratch your back; you scratch mine.' Actually a false sense of serving, with strings attached; expecting something in return.

Perhaps we'd better not try our hand at hosting either, for we are sure to mess that up, too.

You know, maybe we'd best relegate ourselves to the kitchen, with all those pots and pans, dirty sink, and all those things to cook.

Maybe in some ways we can keep out of trouble there, and stay focused on serving, which is what we're called to do anyway. Focus on serving, and avoid the temptation to barter our services for a place at someone else's head table.

Just as Jesus came and washed the disciples' feet: serving others.

Maybe, in our own way, here in the kitchen, we can put ourselves in position where the need is most evident, and we can focus our attention, our lives on serving others.

Maybe here, too, in the kitchen, we'll recognize the reality behind the story of our place in the whole scheme of things.

For in reality God is the host: the ultimate host.

And in being the host, God defines the menu, and the serving, and the guest list. So we'd best be willing to serve whom we are told to serve, which, yes, is everyone, no matter who they are, no matter the color of their skin or their place of origin or their high or low position in life.

Yes, God is the host.

And therefore God is the one who, in the end, gives us our due, hands out the final reward, be that as it may.

"And you will be blessed,...for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

God gives us our task; and God, then, gives the reward for (hopefully) a job well done. Remember last week?

"Blessed are those servants whom the master finds alert –i.e., attentive to what we're supposed to be doing– when he comes; truly I tell you, he will fasten his belt and have them sit down to eat, and he will come and serve them." (Luke 12:37 NRSV)

How good will that be! Massaging tired muscles, soaking aching feet, feeding an empty belly.

Won't that be something, that reward? We can look forward to that, and the satisfaction of a job well done...and having someone spread a table before us where we can sit and sup, relax and rest, sigh and be satisfied.

And you know what?

Someone already has [-pointing to communion table-]: spread the table before us and invited us to come and eat, and be refreshed and revived, sustained and satisfied.

So we come here, to celebrate the Lord's Supper, where he is the host. The Lord's Supper as a sample of that heavenly banquet to which we are all invited.

This table is a reminder of what is to come: a foretaste, in order to help us keep going with all that work we have to do in the kitchen.

A place where we all are invited, and sit with those from North and South and East and West, not only to be served but to serve each other across the table and side to side, and rejoice that we have been invited at all. For we have, not from our own deserving, but simply by the grace of God.

A place where we come to eat and drink, be refreshed and revived, fed and sustained...for the very service to which he calls us.

Ironic, don't you think? It seems he was right after all.

I mean, in a way, we end up at the head table after all. Not by gunning for it, but by giving it up. Not by eyeing it, but by serving it, and those around it.

Just like he did.
