THE WORD

LIGHTING THE ADVENT WREATH: THE CANDLE OF LOVE

- One: The first three candles remind us of the hope we have in Christ's coming, the peace we know in him, and the joy with which we celebrate, not only in this season but always. Our hope and peace and joy all grow out of our experience of God's great love. So we light the fourth candle to remind us of God's love as we see it in the coming of Christ.
- All: What wondrous love is this, that God would come and dwell in our midst to save us from our sins and to give us new life.
- One: The angel said to Joseph, "Mary will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins." (*Matthew 1:21*)

"For thus God loved the world, giving God's only Son, that everyone who believes in him might not perish but have eternal life. For God sent the Son into the world, not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him." (*John 3:16-17*)

Let us pray.

Unison: We rejoice in your great love for us, O God. Kindle within us the fire of your love, that we might share it with others and spread the good news of Christ's coming. Amen.

Sing: "Lo, How a Rose E'er Blooming" GtG 129 (Verse 2)

Isaiah 'twas foretold it, the rose I have in mind; with Mary we behold it, the virgin mother kind. To show God's love aright she bore for us a Savior, when half spent was the night.

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SCRIPTURE READINGS Isaiah 7:10-16 Matthew 1:18-25

ISAIAH 7:10-16 (Common English Bible+)

10 Again the Lord spoke to Ahaz: 11 "Ask a sign from the Lord your God. Make it as deep as the grave or as high as heaven."

12 But Ahaz said, "I will not ask; I will not test the Lord."

13 Then Isaiah said, "Listen, house of David! Is it too little for you to weary mortals, that you weary my God also? 14 Therefore, the Lord will give you a sign. The young woman is pregnant and is about to give birth to a son, and she will name him Immanuel. 15 He will eat curds and honey, and learn to reject evil and choose good. 16 Before the boy learns to reject evil and choose good, the land of the two kings you dread will be abandoned. MATTHEW 1:18-25 (Common English Bible+)

18 This is how the birth of Jesus Christ took place. When Mary his mother was engaged to Joseph, before they were married, she became pregnant by the Holy Spirit. 19 Joseph was a man who always did what was right. Because he did not want to humiliate her, he decided to call off their engagement quietly. 20 As he was thinking about this, an angel from the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife, because the child she carries was conceived by the Holy Spirit. 21 She will give birth to a son, and you will call him Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins." 22 Now all of this took place so that what the Lord had spoken through the prophet would be fulfilled:

23 Look! A virgin will become pregnant

and give birth to a son,

And they will call him, Emmanuel. (Emmanuel means "God with us.")

24 When Joseph woke up, he did just as an angel from God commanded and took Mary as his wife, 25 but had no marital relations with her until she gave birth to a son. Joseph called him Jesus.

PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

SERMON "Wishing for Our Want List" by Pastor Bill Vincent

I think I identify with Ahaz more than I would like to admit.

He thinks he knows what he needs to do. And, in fact, he pursues that route anyway, in spite of Isaiah and the Lord.

Isaiah tells him to ask of the Lord a sign. "This is what God says; this is what God promises. You want proof? Ask for a sign." Rarely does God invite such testing of the divine.

But Ahaz responds with all the right words. "No, I wouldn't do that. I won't ask of the Lord a sign. That would be wrong." He's right, you know. All the right words. But, we strongly suspect, all the wrong heart.

On the one hand, Ahaz really doesn't believe what he's hearing from Isaiah, so he goes with what he knows – the "proper" response.

But I suspect something deeper: I suspect that Ahaz doesn't want to bother God with a sign because Ahaz doesn't want to bother with a sign at all. He already knows what he wants to do, what he wants to happen. If God knows what's good for Ahaz and the country, God will simply go along with what Ahaz already has planned and see to it that his plan succeeds. Then everyone will be happy, everything will be hunky-dory.

But, what Ahaz gets is not what he wants.

What he wants is a military alliance. What he gets is a pregnancy.

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What he wants is power.

What he gets is the promise of weakness, both in the word of his coming defeat and in the coming of a child.

What he wants is his way. What he gets is God's way.

It's not what he wants. But it is what he needs.

We want power.

We are given weakness. A baby, remember?

And we are more like that baby in a manger than we want to admit. We too are helpless, in need of others – or Another – to care for us, to protect us from Herods and others who would strike out at us and knock us down and bleed the life out of us.

And so we think we need a bigger military, and a larger surveillance program, and taller walls. We need to protect ourselves.

And what do we get? A baby: helpless, weak, defenseless. A baby who relies on Another – perhaps we need to, as well.

We want force. We are given love. We want self-reliance – you know, stand on our own 2 feet. We are given, 'You must rely upon me'.

Joseph had it all figured out – just like Ahaz. Oh, it was already not what he expected: Mary pregnant with not-his-child. But he had figured out what would be the best thing to happen: call off the engagement quietly. He'd be off the hook; Mary would avoid a scandal – or worse: stoning.

Then something – or Someone – seemed to speak to him in a dream: "Go ahead and take Mary as your wife; care for the not-your-own child." He had no idea what he was getting into.

It was not what he wanted to hear.

But it was what he needed to hear...and to do.

Sometimes we may get so frustrated when life doesn't go our way.

We want to be able to control others. We want to be able to dictate to others what they will do, how they will act, what they will think, how they will decide.

We want so desperately for others to change.

What we get is a call for us to change. Not that we give in to the whims and dictates of others, but that I realize – and painfully so – that the only one I have a chance of changing is me, and I'm not very good at that either.

It may not be the wisdom we want. But it may just be the wisdom we need. Yes, the world is a mess – much like Ahaz'.

Maybe what we want is someone who can take charge and clean up the mess and force everyone to do what is right and keep everyone on the straight and narrow and take care of everyone's needs; and who will do all that, all the while respecting our wishes, wants, and desires, whatever they may be.

And what do we get?

An infant. Who says nothing, but gurgles and burps. And when he grows up and does speak, we don't like what he says anyway: "Take up your cross. Lose your life. Turn the other cheek." And we certainly don't like what he expects of us: give up our own lives? follow him down this path of seeming self-destruction and definite self-offering?

No, this is not what we want.

But, Yes, it is definitely what we need.

How often do we want guidance in life, answers to our questions.

In the movie "L.A. Story" (1991), Steve Martin is the 'wacky weekend weatherman' in search of meaning in life...and love. Periodically, as he drives along the freeway, his car engine dies; and he is flashed particular, personalized messages on one of the electronic billboards lining the highway.

Now wouldn't that be great? A clear, unmistakable sign; specific instructions, directions, guidance from God as to what to do.

But don't get your hopes up. More often than not, what we are given is a word – or words [--Bible--] – we need to pick up and read and spend time with and talk about and discuss and pray over and debate about in order to hear and understand, to discern an answer, some guidance and direction – and even then, it may not be as specific as we would like.

What we get is a community in which to discuss and debate and share and disagree and wrestle in order to discern some suggestion as to what we are to do and where we are to go and how we are to live.

What we get is a still small voice that we have to shut up long enough and be still long enough to actually hear...if indeed we're sure we heard it aright.

We want answers.

We are given a presence. As if that were enough ... and it may very well be enough. And maybe in our relationship with others, it may be that that presence is the most precious gift we can give: not pat answers, but a personal presence.

Immanuel: God with us. Not 'God answering all your questions'. Not 'God solving all your problems'. But God with us. In our weakness. In our chaos. God with us. In our questions. In our problems. With us. Here. In the midst of life. In the midst of our life. With us.

God does not always answer our prayers the way we want them, with the outcome for which we so desperately plead.

But God does come – and stand by us, and stand with us, and offer us strength and love, and a presence. And sometimes I wonder if, indeed, we can face anything...as long as we know we don't have to face it alone.

And it may not be the answer we want. But it may be the answer we need.

> For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts. (Isaiah 55:8-9 NRSV)

Yes, so often, in terms of life and how to live life... We want strength, invulnerability. We are given weakness. We want control. We are given life beyond our control. We want vengeance, retribution, punishment. We are given forgiveness. We want force. We are given love. We want victory. We are given a cross. We want our way. We are given God's way.

Immanuel: God with us.

"Give up your life, and take up mine," the grown Immanuel would say. "Follow me," he would say. "Take up your cross," he would say.

Immanuel: God with us. A child – a mere child.

It may not be the gift we want. But, Yes, I believe it is precisely the gift we need.
